Weeks 1–10 | All 13 Core Subjects Including PVS

About This Term: The Third Term of JSS 1 is the final and most comprehensive term of the session. It covers advanced grammar (Active/Passive Voice, Tag Questions, Adverbials), geometry (plane shapes, 3D figures, constructions, statistics), energy and physics concepts, nationalism and road to Nigerian independence, civic participation and national integration, digital technology trends (AI, IoT, Robotics), CCA performance arts, and practical PVS skills in livestock farming, garment construction, and food preservation. All 13 subjects are fully covered from Week 1 to Week 10. Week 5 = Mid-term Examination. Week 7 = Mid-term Break. Weeks 11–13 = Final Revision and End-of-Year Examinations.

Note on PVS (Pre-Vocational Studies): PVS covers two strands – Agriculture and Home Economics – taught together or by separate teachers. In the Third Term, Agriculture focuses on crop protection, livestock (poultry and fish farming), and farm records; Home Economics covers stitches, food preservation, food processing, clothing construction, and simple garment making.
